Getting better value from SEA

The Environmental Assessment (Scotland) Act 2005 extended the European Union SEA Directive (2001/42/EC). The SEA Act intended to put 'Scotland ahead of Europe in the protection we afford the environment'.

Increasing numbers of public sector bodies are now required to assess the environmental effects of their plans and programmes. But the requirement to do SEA has environmental, social and economic implications for the public sector.

This conference examines these implications by bringing together a range of expert perspectives

from environmental lawyers,
 local authority officers, Non-Government Oganisations (NGOs)
 and academics – to discuss how
 better value can be gained from SEA
 so that its environmental protection
 objectives can be met.

The implications for Scotland of potential legal challenges to SEA are evaluated in light of the recent High Court rulings in Northern Ireland. Whilst sustainable development's role as a 'guiding principle' for SEA is considered.

This conference provides an opportunity to make a vital contribution to the debate about

the efficiency and effectiveness of SEA. This will encourage further collaboration in and development of environmental protection and regulation.

The impact of legal challenges on SEA

Scotland's commitment to the benefits of SEA is reflected in: the establishment of the SEA Gateway; and the extension of the scope of SEA via the Environmental Assessment (Scotland) Act 2005. Session two:

SEA and environmental justice

Sustainable development is cited as the objective of the SEA Directive. The previous Scottish Government combined their commitment to sustainable development with one to secure 'environmental justice for all of Scotland's communities'. Theoretical debate suggests that the concept of environmental justice could provide a better guide to SEA than sustainable development. This workshop explores this prospect.

Session three:

SEA in action

This final session considers the frameworks in which SEA operates. The evolution of the term sustainable development and how different interpretations of this term can be used to justify certain action or inaction is reviewed. The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) is the only UK Non-Governmental Organisation to have staff dedicated to environmental assessment policy and practice

– how the RSPB are engaged with SEA and the value that the organisation places on this process is highlighted. Challenges to SEA are likely to arise in relation to land use planning. How SEA fits with recent Scottish planning reforms is examined.
