Categorical Exclusions

- Clarify and promote consistent practices for:
 - Development
 - Documentation
 - Public review
 - Approval
 - Use

Environmental Assessments

- Recognize the broad range in size of EAs
- Size should be commensurate with magnitude and complexity of :
 - Environmental issues
 - Public concerns
 - Project scope

Environmental Assessments, cont.

- Describe minimum requirements for short EAs
- Clarify requirements for:
 - Public involvement
 - Alternatives
 - Mitigation

Federal & Interagency Collaboration

- Training for government agencies
- Guidance & templates
- Training for the public
- “Citizen’s Guide to NEPA”

Programmatic Analysis & Tiering

- Clarify different uses
- Clearly define uses and appropriate:
 - Scope
 - Range of issues
 - Depth of analysis
 - Level of description required in documentation

Adaptive Management

- Develop pilot study
- Provide guidance
- Link with environmental management systems
